



MEETING MINUTES

Restoration Advisory Board (RAB)

For the Former Naval Station Roosevelt Roads

Fajardo, Puerto Rico

Meeting No. 1 - February 7, 2007

Note: These minutes are a summary based on informal notes taken at the meeting. They are not intended as a verbatim transcript and may not have captured everything that was discussed. If comments or additional notes are provided by others who were present at the meeting, within 30 days of distribution of these minutes, those will be added as an attachment to these minutes.

I. CALL TO ORDER AND WELCOMING REMARKS

The meeting began at 6:15 p.m. with Susana Struve (CH2M HILL) welcoming everyone and introducing the presenters to the audience. The following agency representatives were in attendance to address local community members' questions and concerns: David Criswell, Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) Deputy Base Closure Manager, Navy; Mark Davidson, Remedial Project Manager for BRAC, Navy; Pedro Ruiz, Environmental Program Manager - Naval Activity Puerto Rico (NAPR); Wilmarie Rivera, Puerto Rico Environmental Quality Board (EQB); Mark Kimes, Baker Environmental, Inc. (Navy Installation Restoration Program Contractor); and Tim Gordon, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). Attachment 1 provides a copy of the attendance list.

II. TOPICS DISCUSSED AND PRESENTATIONS

IIa. Publicizing RAB Meetings - David Criswell welcomed everyone to the meeting and encouraged participation in the RAB to better understand the cleanup and transfer process, its legal process, and guidelines. Mark Davidson addressed Action Item #1 from the November 28, 2006 public meeting, regarding the need for increased public notification about upcoming RAB meetings.

Discussion Points

- John Henry (community member) pointed out that the Portal Del Futuro website was not updated and did not include any information about this RAB meeting. He also voiced concern that the representatives from Portal Del Futuro were not in attendance at

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the meeting. David Criswell answered that Alfonso Martinez, representative of Portal Del Futuro, had indicated prior to the meeting that he would be in attendance. David Criswell also encouraged community members to consult the EPA website for information concerning the RAB meetings.

- Debra McWhirter (community member) pointed out that many community members do not know what the RAB is and what goes on in the meetings. Mark Davidson answered that it is important for the RAB to be the pipeline to the community to bring information to everyone about what is happening at Roosevelt Roads.

Iib. Updated Schedule –Mark Davidson (Navy) presented the revised BRAC property transfer schedule, which was Action Item #2 from the November 28, 2006 public meeting. He discussed the Covenant Deferral Request (CDR) and the accelerated transfer of Los Machos beach and airport areas. He announced that the CDR will be issued some time between March 1- 15 and it will be available for a 30-day public comment period. A special RAB meeting will be convened around mid-March to discuss the CDR. The CDR will be put before the governor to sign in May, after the public has had a chance to comment. See Attachment 2 (meeting handouts).

Discussion Points

- John Henry (community member) voiced concern about the zoning plan. He asked whether Portal Del Futuro had informed the community about it yet. David Criswell said that the zoning plan is currently in development. John Henry said that he had heard that the plan has already been developed, without input from the community.
- Jorge Fernandez Porto (community member) asked about the CDR and what it entails. David Criswell answered that it is a document that is internally developed by the Navy, and has been in development for about two years. It is for the governor to sign in approval of the early transfer of lands that may still require cleanup actions. The RAB will review it before it goes to the general public. He reiterated that a special RAB meeting will be called to go over the document.
- Lirio Márquez D' Acunti (community member) asked if there would also be a public hearing. David Criswell said a public meeting has never been done by the Navy for a CDR before in the U.S., but the Navy will present the CDR to the public at the RAB meeting in mid-March 2007.
- Another question was asked about what kinds of actions or events can delay the schedule? David Criswell answered that many things can happen related to the actual transfer. All are lengthy legal processes.
- Jorge Fernandez Porto asked for more clarification about the Consent Order (CO). Tim Gordon (EPA) answered that that would be discussed during his portion of the presentation. Lirio Marquez asked if, when the lands are transferred, the private owners will keep the RAB informed of the cleanup process. Tim Gordon answered

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that the CO signed between the Navy and the EPA makes the Navy ultimately responsible for the outcome of the cleanup process. He also explained that there will be third party orders between EPA and the new owners for transfer of parcels. David Criswell pointed out that as long as there are cleanup actions in place at Roosevelt Roads, there will be a RAB. Mark Davidson added that since the cleanup work performed by the Local Reuse Authority (LRA) will be under a federal grant, there will be funds allocated for public involvement (i.e., RAB).

- An audience member then voiced concerns about health problems caused by exposure to contamination. Susana Struve (CH2M HILL) said that this meeting was not the correct forum for that discussion, and directed the person to address his concerns with the entity responsible for public health concerns. David Criswell directed the discussion back to the cleanup and transfer of the property.

Iic. Base Closure and Cleanup Decision Process

Mark Davidson introduced Action Item #3 from the November 28, 2006 meeting regarding the decision process to close the base. David Criswell presented information detailing the process of base closure and transfer of parcels. See Attachment 3 (meeting presentations).

Iid. RAB Administration

Susana Struve presented information about the administration of the RAB. A community Co-Chair will be elected and each RAB must develop their own mission and operating procedures. Examples of charters (operating procedures) from other RABs were handed out to meeting participants (see Attachment 2).

Discussion Points

- An audience member asked about the applicant from Washington, D.C. (Susana Struve asked whether he should be allowed to participate in the RAB, or simply serve as an observer). Susana said that this should be a decision that is made and incorporated into the charter; the issue of whether someone who is not residing in the community should be admitted to the RAB. John Henry said that if the person has environmental knowledge than he could serve in an advisory capacity, but not as a member.
- Jorge Fernandez Porto asked why the Vieques RAB charter was not handed out to members as an example. Why one from Alaska? Susana Struve pointed out that all RABs are administered and operate in a similar manner, and that these other examples are also applicable. She added that the Vieques charter had been developed to address specific issues for that location and is not entirely typical of other RABs' charters. In response to the observation that it was the only available example in Spanish, the Vieques charter was handed out.

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Ile. Consent Order/Discussion

Tim Gordon (EPA) presented an overview of the CO that was signed in January by EPA and the Navy. Copies of the press release and the comments/responses from the public meeting held to take comments on the CO in September were distributed to the meeting participants (see Attachment 2, handouts).

Discussion Points

- John Henry asked whether the comment/response document addressed verbal as well as written comments (i.e., verbal comments made during the meeting in September 2006). Tim Gordon replied that this document is a summary and does not address every comment made. Many comments are similar in nature, thus the aim was to summarize the principal points made at the meeting as well as in the written comments.
- John Henry voiced concern that some specific comments regarding detailed information of contamination were not addressed, and thus not considered. Tim Gordon requested that if the public has specific information regarding contamination at the site they should submit that information in writing to the attention of the EPA Project Manager (Tim Gordon) at 290 Broadway, 22nd floor, New York, NY 10007, as well as to the Navy.
- A meeting participant raised concern about the contamination in the landfill. There is concern that it is now being covered, and wondered who will remove the contamination? Tim Gordon replied that the EPA has approved the landfill cap process, and that it will be strictly regulated and monitored for 30 years. If any releases of contamination from the landfill area are found, action to address that contamination will be taken. Usage restrictions will be put in place. He added that information about the landfill process was made available during the public comment period (September 2006) and that the landfill closure plan is available in the public information repositories.
- A meeting participant asked if the Navy had a permit for hazardous waste disposal at the landfill. Tim Gordon replied that the Navy does not. Based on the information available to EPA, it is EPA's understanding that since the RCRA laws were passed in 1976, no hazardous waste has been deposited at the landfill. Any hazardous waste removed from the site must be disposed of or treated at an authorized hazardous waste disposal or treatment facility. Since no such commercial facility is located in Puerto Rico, any hazardous wastes generated by the Navy must be transported to a permitted disposal or treatment facility located in the U.S. mainland.
- A meeting participant asked if the landfill can be transferred and used for other purposes. Tim Gordon explained the third party order process, and that if the landfill is acceptably "capped" and monitored, it might in the future be approved for

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certain non-residential purposes, such as for recreational usage (for example, a golf course or a ball field, or a park).

- A meeting participant voiced concern that there are contaminated sites that the Navy is not aware of, which community members know of. Tim Gordon encouraged community members with this knowledge to formally document it in a letter and send it to the EPA at the address given previously, and to the Navy. Once this information is verified, it can be addressed (through investigation and monitoring).
- A meeting participant asked that every time an action is taken by the Navy at the base, to please document it in a report and make that information available to the public.
- Jorge Fernandez Porto said that he thought that the type of a decision to close a landfill would be discussed with the public. Instead, it was done without informing the public and having a public comment period. He was concerned that there were high concentrations of heavy metals in the water around the landfill. Tim Gordon replied that the meeting in September served as a public review of the landfill closure plan. He says there was a discussion about it, but that no written comments were received. He added that monitoring for contamination is being performed every 6 months, and will continue for 30 years.
- A meeting participant pointed out that EPA is having difficulty communicating the real nature of what is being done. He said that situations of contamination also exist outside of the base, and are no different. There are landfills in Fajardo that are contaminated, and few local businesses have permits for disposal. He said that the EPA should be clearer.

III. ADJOURNMENT

The meeting was adjourned at 9:10 p.m. Because other agenda items had run over the allotted time, the presentation about status of sites on the base was postponed. Lirio Marquez requested that the next meeting begin with that site status report by Mark Kimes. Handouts were distributed (see Attachment 2). Attachment 3 provides copies of the presentation, (including the portion that was postponed).

The Navy suggested March 14th, 2007, for the next meeting date so that RAB members can be informed about the Covenant Deferral Request (CDR) and will have a chance to ask questions, before the formal public comment period begins.

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

Decision to close and transfer the base (Public Law 108-87, Sept. 2003)

- **SEC. 8132. (a) CLOSURE OF NAVAL STATION ROOSEVELT ROADS, PUERTO RICO.**
 - Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the Secretary of the Navy shall close Naval Station Roosevelt Roads, Puerto Rico, no later than 6 months after enactment of this Act.
- **SEC. 8132. (b) IMPLEMENTATION.**
 - The closure provided for in subsection (a), and subsequent disposal, shall be carried out in accordance with the procedures and authorities contained in the Defense Base Closure and Realignment Act of 1990 (title XXIX of Public Law 101–510; 10 U.S.C. 2687).





BRAC Process to close and transfer the base

- **Goal: 3 years**
- **Plan: Overlap Closure and Disposal**
 1. Move assets; cease operations; close the base
 2. Simultaneously with the above:
 - *Environmental Characterization (cleanup required): ECP*
 - *DOD Screening and Transfer (Guard, Reserves, Active)*
 - *Federal Agency Screening and Transfer (Fed-to-Fed)*
 - *Personal Property Screening*
 - *Homeless Screening*
 - *Local Reuse Authority (LRA) Identification/Plan*
 - *Disposal: All methods, but more reliance on market*





Types of BRAC transfers

(Defense Base Closure and Realignment Act of 1990)

- **Sale**
 - Sealed bid, on-line auction, live auction
 - Examples: Tustin, El Toro, and San Pedro, CA; Charleston, SC; Orlando, FL
- **Public Benefit Conveyance (PBC)**
 - To Public Entity for conservation; parks; airports; hospitals; etc.
 - No-Cost: “Free”; STRINGS ATTACHED
- **Economic Development Conveyance (EDC)**
 - Minimal housing; job creation is the focus
 - Discounted (often no-cost); STRINGS ATTACHED
 - Negotiated
 - Cost: Similar rules to No-Cost, but \$ return to the Government





Transferring Roosevelt Roads

- **Disposal began with Closure**
 - Closure in six months required
- **Fed-to-Fed**
 - “As is, where is”; receiving agency takes on cleanup
- **Environmental**
 - Characterized early & faster; sell with property
- **Homeless**
 - Realistic and coordinated
- **Reuse Plan**
 - Approved by HUD w/ Navy Concurrence 03/24/05




Transferring Roosevelt Roads

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
- **Public Benefit Conveyances (PBC)**
 - Airport; hospital; NO schools; realistic
- **Economic Development Conveyances**
 - two small parcels at fair-market cost
- **PBC Conservation Transfers:**
 - 55% of property
- **Public Sales**
 - predominate in non-conservation properties





Cleanup and transfer authority

- **Environmental Cleanup via Public Sale:**
Public Law 101-510, Section 2905(e)
- **RCRA Section 7003 Administrative Order:**
Navy and EPA agreement
 - signed 29 January 2007

Summary from last meeting

- **Purpose of a RAB: exchanging information**
 - Community learns about cleanup progress, discusses with the agencies
 - Agencies hear constructive community comments and suggestions about environmental cleanup activities
 - RAB meetings are always open to the public
- **Government agencies are legally responsible for making cleanup decisions**
- **Will give respectful consideration to the comments of RAB members**



RAB Membership guidelines

- **Usually about 20-25 community members**
 - 12 people have applied since November
- **Should reflect the different interests and concerns of the affected local community**
 - Local community = Ceiba, Naguabo and Fajardo
 - Long-time and new residents, businesses, fishing, farming, environmental, medical, educators, people who belong to groups, and people who don't...





RAB Membership (so far)

- **Local government officials and agencies**
 - 3 municipalities invited to send representatives
- **Local residents (Ceiba, Naguabo or Fajardo)**
 - 8 from Ceiba, 2 from Fajardo, none from Naguabo
 - 1 lives in San Juan, but was advisor to Ceiba residents on reuse plan
 - 1 lives in Washington, DC, but has knowledge relevant to environmental cleanup
 - make an exception to “local” rule?
 - or could participate as invited guest



RAB Membership (so far)

- **Different backgrounds:**
 - Business owners/operators (3)
 - School Principal or Teachers (1)
 - University (1)
 - Youth (1)
 - Religious leaders (5)
 - Environmental group or interest (4)
 - Worked at or knowledge of Roosevelt Roads (6)

RAB members needed

- **Naguabo residents**
- **Fajardo residents**

- **Local government**
- **Local health care/knowledge**



Electing a Community Co-Chair

- **RABs have two Co-Chairs**
 - Navy Co-Chair is appointed
 - Community Co-Chair is elected by community members
- **We are still accepting new members**
 - Plan to elect Co-Chair at next meeting
- **Process**
 - Nomination by another community member
 - Only community members can vote
 - Voting can be “closed door” or in open RAB meeting





RAB Operating Procedures

- **2006 Department of Defense RAB Rule**
 - Activities that can be performed by a RAB
 - Establishing a RAB
 - Responsibilities of RAB members
 - Steps to adjourn or dissolve a RAB
- **Each RAB must develop its own mission and operating procedures, within the RAB Rule**
 - Mission: what do we plan to accomplish?
 - Operating procedures specific to each RAB
 - Documented in a RAB Charter and signed by RAB members
 - Sample charters for review and discussion at our next meeting








Issues to think about

- **How can this RAB be productive and efficient?**
 - Reviewing documents
 - Giving comments and responses
 - Resolving disputes
 - Informing the general community
- **Membership rules**
 - Members should attend each meeting or send an alternate
 - *What do we do if a member does not attend regularly?*
 - *What do we do if someone disrupts meetings?*
 - How will we choose new members if some leave?
 - How long will the Community Co-Chair serve?



RCRA Consent Order (Agreement) Finalized

- **Signed by Navy and EPA**
 - effective as of January 29, 2007
- **EPA carefully considered and has now responded to comments from the public**
 - EPA held a 30-day public comment period from Sept. 12 to Oct. 12, 2006
 - EPA held a public meeting on September 27
 - *Navy, EQB and Local Reuse Authority participated*

 - Ceiba public library





RCRA Consent Order (Agreement) Provides

- **Framework for transfer and cleanup**
 - Allows Navy to transfer clean parcels
 - Ensures that parcels with contamination will be remediated
 - *according to Federal and Commonwealth standards*
 - *to protect human health and the environment*



Summary of comments on the Draft RCRA agreement

- **Will contaminated soils be disposed of in Ceiba?**
 - The only permitted hazardous waste disposal facilities are on the US mainland
 - Non-hazardous soils may be disposed of in Puerto Rico, at authorized solid-waste disposal facilities
- **Schedule for the clean-up operations?**
 - Schedules will be part of EPA-approved work plans
- **Transferring parcels to Puerto Rico**
 - Cleanup under “Third Party” agreement if PR Government assumes responsibility; otherwise Navy responsible for cleanup





Summary of comments

(continued)

- **Administrative process if a “Third Party” transfers land to another party**
 - They would be included in terms applying to the “Third Party”
- **Contaminated sites on the “Future Residential Housing” parcel (website map)**
 - Website map was wrong; parcel marked as housing will go to Army



Summary of comments

(continued)


- **Concern with allowing Navy to sell property and transfer responsibility for clean-up to another entity**
 - Navy remains legally responsible until cleanup is completed by third party
- **Concern with the proposed redevelopment and reuse plan**
 - Consent Order does not address reuse, to whom parcels are transferred, or the role of the Local Reuse Authority






Overview of Sites





Overview of sites

- **35 sites are suitable for transfer without land use controls**
 - any type of future land use
- **6 sites are suitable for transfer with controls**
 - future land use limited
 - *industrial but not housing or child care*
- **42 sites have work remaining**
 - 20 of these sites are currently being investigated or cleaned up by the Navy
 - can be transferred with contractual agreement for cleanup



Overview of sites, cont.

- **Of the 42 with work remaining, 20 sites are currently being investigated or cleaned up by the Navy:**
 - 16 Solid Waste Management Units (SWMUs)
 - *Area where contaminants were released into the environment*
 - *SWMUs are 1, 2, 3, 9, 13, 14, 16, 18, 27, 28, 29, 42, 45, 46, 53, and 68*
 - 4 Areas of Concern (AOCs)
 - *Areas that might have contamination, based on previous use, but are not clearly linked to waste management activities*
 - *Areas that were under the EQB Underground Storage Tank program*
 - *AOCs are A, C, E, F*





Investigations: SWMUs 16, 27, 28, 29, 42, 68, and AOC A

- **November 2006 Phase I RCRA Facility Investigation (RFI) Investigation has been completed**
 - Data Validation still underway
 - *sampling data checked by an independent validator*
 - Development of Draft Phase I RFI Reports underway
 - Draft Reports due to EPA 60 days after Data Validation



Clean-up: SWMUs 9, 13, 46, 53, and AOC C

- **SWMU 9 and 13:**
 - Contaminated soil has been removed
 - Additional excavation required
 - Awaiting contract modification
- **SWMU 46, 53 and AOC C:**
 - Excavation is complete
 - All confirmation samples are clean
 - Awaiting backfill





Investigations: SWMU 14

- **RCRA Facility Investigation completed**
 - Draft RFI Report was submitted to EPA on 18 Dec 2006



Investigations: SWMUs 1, 2

- **Ecological Risk Assessment underway**
 - Baseline Ecological Risk Assessment (ERA) Work Plan submitted to EPA on 10 Jan 2007
 - Upon EPA approval, field work (sampling) will be scheduled and implemented
 - Baseline ERA Report to be developed following Field Investigation and submitted to EPA





Investigations: SWMU 45

- **Ecological Risk Assessment underway**
 - Baseline ERA Field Investigation is underway
 - Baseline ERA Report to be developed following Field Investigation and submitted to EPA



Investigations: SWMU 9

- **Additional investigation is needed**
 - Baseline ERA Report postponed due to finding of stained soils during soil removal action
 - Conduct investigation to address stained soil
 - Resume Baseline ERA Report after addressing stained soil investigation and report





Groundwater Monitoring: SWMU 3 (NAPR Solid Waste Landfill)

- **Semi-Annual Groundwater Monitoring Program is in place according to RCRA**
- **September 2006 Semi-Annual Groundwater Sampling completed**
 - Draft Semi-Annual Groundwater Monitoring Report for September 2006 submitted to the Navy for review
 - Draft Report to be submitted to EPA
- **March 2007 Groundwater Sampling Event to be scheduled**



Investigation/Closure: SWMU 18

- **Phase II closure report was submitted to EPA in September 2006**
 - Based on conclusions from the initial and Phase II closure activities, the Navy recommends a site-specific Risk Assessment
 - Perform Risk Assessment in accordance with the EPA approved Work Plan





Investigation: AOE E

- **Completed scan on land and in water for potential unexploded ordnance (UXO)**
- **Investigating areas identified during UXO scan**
- **Develop report upon completion of investigations**



Investigation/Monitoring: AOC F

- **All petroleum sites under EQB's Underground Storage Tank (UST) program have been moved into the RCRA 7003 Order as "AOC F"**
 - All these sites will be reevaluated to determine new long term strategy to address these sites
 - New Work Plan to be developed and implemented
